Rob is a retired engineer who now volunteers with the Institute of Engineering and Technology to bring more STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Maths) into schools. He came and spoke to our band of budding robot warriors and also lent the school several of the robots to prepare us for challenge day.

Students had had a little experience using robots way back in the distant days of Year 6 with their previous schools, and to start with were a little rusty. However, all committed to spending a number of lunchtimes practicing, remembering, programming and testing until we hit the point where we were ready for battle. After trekking the vast distance to the big place known as Petroc (our hosts for the event), the students were all set for battle!

This was followed by a presentation evening at Torrington, where Norah won an award in the shape of a bat house, for her work.














International School: Amigos – Sponsorship Making it Real...

Our international work continues with 18 Year 10 and 11 students selected to represent the Academy on next summer's Uganda Trip. The hard work for this fantastic group of dedicated students now starts as they attempt to fundraise monies to help them meet their targets to fund their trip. This trip will allow all of them to engage further with the work that Amigos does with disadvantaged individuals in Uganda. Part of the work they will do whilst in Uganda will be working with trainees at Kira Farm and they will meet with the trainee that we as a school currently sponsor through our previous fundraising work carried out. This trainee is currently called Daniel Okello and he is hoping to benefit from the investment Amigos put into him by learning skills and a trade by attending Kira so that when he returns to his village, he can then train others whilst earning an income from his work. This sustainable practice is at the forefront of the work Amigos do.



Daniel is 19, and is a shy, smart young man with a pensive look about him. The combination of past crises and the pending uncertain future keep playing in his mind as he speaks. You can almost see the brakes in his mind moving. There is a hesitancy when he talks about himself and his life experience as if worried that he might say a wrong thing to get him into trouble. It will take a while to settle in an environment that allows him to open up about his life back home. Daniel has grown up in a family of seven with both his father and mother with his siblings - two girls and two boys. Life at home has been far from ideal. His father does nothing at home except drinking and socialising while ignoring his responsibilities. The children have been forced to mature fast to ensure they contribute to the wellbeing of the home. They each go out looking for jobs to contribute to the family budget. When it comes to paying school fees, they

rotate the opportunity to attend school among each other, so that in turn everyone gets a chance to go to school some years.
