Braunton Co-operative Learning Trust

The cooperative is still working closely to support all students in the Braunton catchment area be successful at every stage of their education. This term we have met to review the impact of our collaboration last year, where we saw positive improvements for all schools. We were also able to demonstrate improved transition arrangements and greater cross phase partnership at a subject curriculum level. This year we have identified the following areas for partnership work.

- To improve attendance across all schools following the pandemic
- To further develop students writing abilities, this skill has been most significantly hit across both phases during the pandemic
- Continue to increase opportunities for community events and enrichment opportunities
- Continue to share good practice at a senior leadership and governance level

Over the next two terms I will update you on the work that takes place. One of the key actions for the Academy in supporting the Braunton Partnership is the work towards the expansion of our school to support the number of students in the catchment area. I shared the findings of the consultation with you earlier in the term. The application for the change is currently with the Department of Education awaiting approval. The building plans are close to reaching stage 3 of the process and then will move to formal consultation as part of the planning permission process. There will be a consultation evening at the Academy at the end of January where families and local residents can study the formal plans and make further comments as part of the planning permission process.

English Department News

The English department have been talking about how English features in the future lives of our students. Over the coming year, we are going to be discussing how our subject fits into the wider world, in particular, apprenticeships, literature as a subject to study at A-Level, employment, speaking and listening skills in the wider world, the utility of language skills, e.g. emails, websites, etc and English courses at aspirational universities.

In this post we wanted to touch upon how English skills fit in with apprenticeships. You might think that English isn't all that relevant in this pathway. But you would be wrong. The need for good English skills from writing to speaking and listening are essential in the apprenticeship setting. For example, you may be asked to prepare and write a report; clarity, good spelling and punctuation will be skills you'll be glad you worked on here at Braunton Academy and you may look back and feel grateful for all of those SPAG lessons you had.

Reading is another skill you will need. You may be looking at complicated, subject-specific language and you might be asked to decode and understand complicated instructions. Keep your regular reading habits up now and you will reap the benefits later.

Last but not least are the speaking and listening skills we help you develop here at school. You will be asked to speak in a variety of ways in your apprenticeships. You will need to be able to speak clearly, using good standard English and that confidence we helped you build here will help you enormously on your course. We hope that information was helpful to some. In our next post we will look at A Level options.

Holidays During Term Time

Holidays can only be authorised in exceptional circumstances. Unauthorised absences may result in a Penalty Notice referral being sent to the Local Authority, who will then make the final decision about whether a Penalty Notice Fine should be issued.

Should a Penalty Notice be issued as a result of unauthorised absence then one notice will be issued to each parent/carer for each child involved. Currently, each Penalty Notice is for £120, which is reduced to £60 if paid within the first 21 days. If a Penalty Notice goes unpaid after 28 days, then court proceedings will be initiated. **Term dates for this academic year are on the last page of this newsletter.**

Reporting an Absence

Parents can now report student absences on the ParentMail app. This is our preferred method as it leaves the phone lines free in the mornings, and is a quick and efficient way of letting us know your child will not be in school due to having a medical appointment, is off sick, etc.

Braunton Academy Take Part in Local Democracy Engagement

Officers and councillors from North Devon Council visited Braunton Academy where students took part in a fun-filled programme of activities related to the climate. This ties in with COP27, a yearly summit where governments come together to agree steps to limit global temperature rises, and follows on from Local Democracy Week which took place in October of this year.

Students were involved in a short presentation introducing North Devon Council, climate change and carbon footprinting, a game illustrating how to calculate your carbon footprint and an interactive session for Q&A, as well as tips on how to reduce your carbon footprint

This programme fits with the Department of Education's national curriculum for Geography at KS3, which states "understand how human and physical processes interact to influence, and change landscapes, environments and the climate; and how human activity relies on effective functioning of natural systems."

Lead member for Climate Change at North Devon Council, Councillor Graham Lofthouse says: "The young people who we met today will be the decision-makers of the future and that's why we felt it was vitally important that the topic we focused on was the climate. With global temperatures rising, it's crucial we take action now. Collectively, people's actions are the only way that we can stop, and then eventually reverse, the overheating of our planet. Democracy is demonstrated best with people power!

Lead member for Environment at North Devon Council, Councillor Netti Pearson, says: "This has been a great opportunity and has allowed us as district councillors and officers to get out there and find out what matters to the young people of North Devon.

Mrs Moy says: "Engaging young people in local democracy is vital because this is the method by which our students who are passionate about the environment can actually help shape decisions at the local level. Meeting the Councillors and the Sustainability and Climate Officer this afternoon really helped our students feel like they have a voice and that there are local councillors working to protect their future.

Braunton Academy Youth Speaks Competition

September began with new Youth Speaks teams: five teams were created in the senior section and three in the intermediate, and every Tuesday, the teams would meet to write and practise their 15 minute debates. During the week of the 6th December, we held a Braunton Academy senior and intermediate competition during periods 5 and 6 to choose the two teams that would go forward to the North Devon School's competition in January 2023. We listened to debates on a range of topics from Should Shakespeare still be taught in schools to the benefits of cloning and organ donation.

We chose the team consisting of Izzy H as chair, and Izzy R and Flo as the main speakers to represent the school in the intermediate section and couldn't decide between two of the senior teams, so have decided to put two teams through: Freya, Sian and Amelia will debate cloning and Lola-Belle, Miranda and Amelie will debate Shakespeare. Despite only three teams being chosen to perform in the North Devon competition, we were blown away by the confident and sophisticated performances of all our teams. Our first competition is on Saturday 21st January 2023 so wish us luck!







Latin American Guest Speakers

Year 11 Food Technology students are currently working on their NEA task (coursework task) which is based upon North and South American cuisine. Natali Purdy-Guevara from El Salvador and Nora Espinosa-Corston from Mexico who are both parents of students at Braunton Academy kindly gave up their free time to come into school to talk about traditional food from their home countries. Students were able to listen to them talk about flavours, herbs and spices and were even able to smell and hold products like cassava and plantain not easily found in this country. Natali and Nora shared recipes and ideas with the students which they will later experiment with during their coursework trials after Christmas. This visit has enabled the students to gather primary research and is invaluable for



the students to learn first hand about life and food in other parts of the world

Both Nora and Natali have been invited back to watch the students in action after hopefully making some of the recipes that they shared with us. Braunton Academy would like to thank them both for giving up their time, and for preparing and sharing such wonderful resources with us all.

Rainbow Flag Club

Our Rainbow Flag club has been running for some time now but we felt it was time to strengthen diversity within the Academy. We decided to do this through completing the Intercom Trust Rainbow Flag Award over the next year. Although this is an LGBT award, we are working to ensure that diversity in other ways is also highlighted across the Academy e.g. different social and ethnic backgrounds, different genders, religions etc. This term we have had anti bullying assemblies, a safeguarding assembly about child on child abuse awareness and the launch of the Rainbow Flag Award itself. These have raised the importance of acceptance of others from a wide





range of backgrounds. We had training from the Kooth organisation with Years 9 and 10, encouraging support of each other and knowing where to access external support. This session was then followed by staff training to enable staff to feel more confident in dealing with homophobic behaviour and supporting our LGBT students. A student questionnaire showed that 69.7% feel that "students accept each other for who they are" with a further 23.6% saying "most students accept each other for who they are". This is encouraging but we hope to raise this even closer to 100% of students feeling all other students accept them. We hope to put a plan into place for the new year using the ideas from the student questionnaire to make the Academy more inclusive particularly in terms of multicultural awareness.

'Where to Begin' - Beaford Arts

November was a busy month for the Expressive Arts Department which saw the return of live theatre performances to Braunton Academy.
